LGPOA Meeting on May 15th and Conference Call on May 31st From Secretary, Terrie Weibley:

An LGPOA meeting was held on May 15th. Though it was already scheduled, it became a forum for islanders to voice their concerns or support about the closing of the north-south corridor on LGI by a property owner.

At a board member's home, attendees first heard Old Business, including further plans to develop a refrigerator magnet with two purposes, dog owner courtesy guidelines and important numbers for island residents/guests. The 4th of July Picnic will be held on Saturday, June 30th. Everyone's invited. The main course will be prepared by our Fire Chief, Bill Underhill, along with potluck dishes brought by attendees. Marina issues continue to concern islanders; restrictions on loading and parking as well as business logos on vehicles have been implemented at Gasparilla Marina. Adequate marina spaces for boats loom on the horizon. The Board Planning Committee efforts to meet with Charlotte County Administrators on the marina needs issues have thus far been thwarted.

Island residents weighed in on their views and/or solutions regarding the closing of the north-south corridor. Concerns raised included private property rights and the need for essential services to be provided throughout the island, necessitating a road. Each islander present was free to share their viewpoint as board members listened and asked questions. President Richard Leydon used an enlarged aerial photo to demonstrate the area that has been blocked and the short-term solution that would involve the least number of property owners for the right-of-way. At present, it is recognized that businesses, such as contractors, are at the mercy of a lack of access, particularly to the south end, and a solution is needed. Multiple options are being considered with the hope that a solution can be found without undue difficulty to islanders. President Leydon welcomes the expertise of those who have the know-how to help in resolving this issue.

Islanders ate brownies and chatted after the meeting ended. The long-term question before us is how to ensure a corridor will remain open for the future. The county has not been willing to meet with the board's representatives on this issue.

**Environmental Update

Nesting Turtles

From Florida Wildlife Commission Permit holders for LGI, Laura, Lena and Ava Dallas:

We have a Kemp's Ridley nest among our other nests on LGI. The Kemp's Ridley is the RAREST sea turtle on the planet. Yes, you read that right, on the PLANET. Even island residents and guests can help ensure turtle nest survival by keeping your dogs off the beach. On Memorial Day weekend, many loose dogs were loose on the beach sniffling and snuffling around the dunes, etc. Even if we don't see you, canine prints

on and circling the nesting screens are evident. Come on humans, you can do it! Many people are receptive to the gentle reminder that sea turtles are endangered and are nesting on LGI this time of year. Here's some other information about the Kemp's Ridley species, which has never been reported on LGI before!

FACTS & TIDBITS

- This is the only species that nests primarily during the day. They also nest in mass similar to their relative the Olive Ridley (also known as an Arribada).
- They possess triangular-shaped heads with hooked beaks and strong jaws. They inhabit near-shore habitats where they forage for their favorite prey, crabs. They also eat fish, jellies, shrimp, and a variety of mollusks.
- They are considered Critically Endangered around the world by the IUCN Red List and listed as Endangered in the US.
- Kemp's Ridleys reach sexual maturity between 10-15 years of age, which is significantly younger than most other species.
- Their scientific name is Lepidochelys kempii.

As of May 29th, we're at 15 nests with 32 false crawls island-wide.

Nesting Shorebirds

The large area marked off at the southern end of the island is for the nesting shorebirds, specifically the Least Terns. We have identified quite a few nests. They are so well camouflaged that it would be easy to step on them. The birds clearly don't want people or animals around, and they'll let you know if you're anywhere near them by swooping and squawking. Keeping animals off the beach will best help protect the nests.

Thank you all for educating your guests and neighbors and keeping the beach fairly clean so far this season.

**Little Gasparilla Island Fire and Rescue (LGIFR) Update (The LGPOA is not affiliated with the LGIFR, we just want to keep you up to date on all island activities.)

From LGIFR Fire Chief, Bill Underhill:

I would like to remind everyone that the gates and fence have not changed our ability for a timely response.

The burn ban has been lifted and we are free to burn. If anyone needs a hand with a larger than normal pile, call me at the station and I will be happy to assist.

A friendly reminder...it's that time of year again. The storms are on the way. Make sure to have what you need for food, water, batteries and any medications. Also, to be mindful of where you place a generator. It

needs to be a safe distance from combustible products and in an area that's well ventilated.

CCFR (Charlotte County Fire and Rescue) recently purchased a new boat that will service the island. They will be coming to different areas to practice landing the boat and transferring patients. If anyone wishes to take a look at the boat and meet the crew, feel free to stop by and visit. For your information, if their emergency lights are off, they are training.
