****Environmental Update**

From LGI's FWC Turtle Permit Holder, Bren Curtis:

Migrating Shorebirds

Fall has come to Little Gasparilla Island at the same time bird migration has kicked in along the Atlantic flyway. Although most birds fly near the east coast of Florida to navigate, some of them fly over the island and the west coast. In the last weekend of September, there were 10,000 to 18,000 birds migrating in the Boca Grande area according to Cornell's Live Birdcast site (see below). Many of them fly at night and need dark skies just as the sea turtle hatchlings do. Light pollution of humans interferes with bird and sea turtle navigation, so we can do our part and use motion sensors to cut down on lights especially during fall migration and the last month of October sea turtle nest hatches.

September 6th was World's Shorebird Day and many of the shorebirds seen on LGI shores breed in Florida. According to FWC, some of the Florida breeding shorebird species are Snowy Plover, Wilson's Plover, Willet, American Oystercatcher, Brown Pelican, Double-crested Cormorant, Anhinga, 6 Heron species, 4 Egret species, Terns (Royal, Sandwich and Least), Laughing Gull, and Black Skimmer. All of these have been seen along the beaches from Stump Pass to the southern end of LGI. None of these species nested on LGI this year but some were successful just north on Palm Island. Least Terns and Wilson Plovers were successful in raising chicks on Palm Island and across the pass in Stump Pass Park.

So when you are out on the beach this fall you might be lucky to see shorebirds that are migrating through Florida and stopping to re-nourish themselves before moving on. Black-bellied, Piping, and Semipalmated Plovers stay a while and some even winter here in Florida. You might see Dowitchers, Marbled Godwits, Redknots, Sandpipers, Whimbrels, Sanderlings, Ruddy Turnstones and a few rare sightings of other stopover shorebirds.

Happy birding this fall and winter! Check with Ebird online for reported sightings.
