Hurricane season reminders:

Have a personal plan in place. Do not put yourself and others in danger by making poor or late decisions. Keep extra medications, spare oxygen for CPAP, first aid kit, water, food, gas, and generator for a 3-day minimum. If you are asked to evacuate the island, do so in a timely manner. Always let someone know where you are staying. Remember, many island paths will flood and island transportation or rescue may not be possible. The shuttle will not run in high wind/water situations.

Upside Down Jellyfish/ Mangrove Jellyfish xamachana or frondosa

This is a common jellyfish found among the mangrove roots and in shallow bays in tropical waters. Cassiopea contain symbiotic algae giving them a greenish brown color. The algae provide food and nutrients for the jellyfish, and in turn the jelly provides a home and stays in shallow waters so the algae can carry on photosynthesis. The jellyfish can also filter feed on microscopic prey. The sting of the upside-down jellyfish is mild compared to other jellies.
